National Curriculum Objectives

Partake in class discussion. Listen to others ideas and opinions. Read aloud and understand the meaning of new words. Maintain positive attitudes to reading and understanding of what he/she reads by identifying and discussing themes and conventions in writing. Understand what he/she reads by asking questions to improve his/her understanding of complex texts. Use a wide range of clause structures, sometimes varying their position within the sentence. Use commas to clarify meaning or avoid ambiguity. Link ideas across paragraphs using adverbials of time e.g. later, place e.g. nearby, and number e.g. secondly, or tense choices e.g. he had seen the beast before. Ensure the consistent and correct use of tense throughout a piece of writing
